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




NEW! Cuthair Yellowhorse, Series Two

David Yellowhorse now has created the second in his series of collectible knives honoring his great-grandfather, Cuthair Yellowhorse. From point to butt, it's an impressive knife, 8¾" overall. Between the gleaming brass guard and butt is a brilliantly crafted handle combining designs made of turquoise, malachite, mother-of-pearl, coral and desertwood, with finely detailed brass filigree. The brass inset on one side depicts Cuthair, the silversmith, at work. On the other side is a proud horse, in brass, which serves as the Yellowhorse symbol. The 41/6-inch blade, designed by Arizona knifemaker Bill Cheatham, is chipped-flint steel, conjuring up visions of arrowheads and spear points. Cuthair Yellowhorse, Series Two, comes in a beautiful display box, with the face of Cuthair laser-etched on the lid. This is a limited series of 1,868 serialized knives, commemorating the year of Cuthair's birth. (Some Series One Cuthair knives are still available; ask your Buck sales rep.)

NEW! Cuthair III

David Yellowhorse has now created the third knife in his planned series of six honoring his great-grandfather, Cuthair Yellowhorse. The handle design features a ceremonial drum, symbolizing the Navajo traditional cere-monies, based on their beliefs in the four worlds -- the Fourth World was the Glittering World where all worlds were brought together in harmony. From point to butt, this knife is 8¾". Yellowhorse's distinctive channel inlay technique combines desert ironwood, turquoise, malachite, coral, and brass. The 41/6-inch blade, designed by Bill Cheatham, is chipped-flint steel, evoking images of arrowheads and spear points.
